Youth Non-Profit Expands to East County. Building \$5M 8,500-sq-ft Youth Center on Former PAL Site

Focus on At-risk Youth. Facility to Open Fall 2015.

Friends of the Children, a

Portland non-profit, is making a significant investment in the East County community. The non-profit agency has begun the final planning phase of their budgeted \$5 million project an 8,500-square-foot youth center located next to Pat Pfeiffer Park on NE 172nd Ave.

Construction is set to begin in February, and the facility opens in the fall of 2015.

Founded in 1993, Friends of the Children is a mentoring program dedicated to transforming the lives of children in need. Youth are selected in kindergarten and paired with a "Friend," a full-time professional mentor. Youth's benefit from this strength-based relationship through high school graduation.

The organization currently serves over 425 youth, half of whom live east of I-205. According to Friends of the Children's COO, Mark Young, the organization anticipates enrolling many of each year's new

class of kindergartners from East County elementary schools. The program focuses on enrolling youth whose life challenges put them most at-risk of school failure, juvenile delinquency and early parenting.

As a way to support children and families in the surrounding neighborhoods, the <u>City of Gresham</u> is making available the former <u>Police Activities League</u> site to Friends of the Children through a 99-year lease for \$1 per year.

Albertina Kerr Historic Louise Home to Receive \$2.7M Update & Addition



New 4,000 sq.ft. 2-story addition to historic Louise Home

Built in 1925 as a juvenile hospital offering maternity services for dependent girls, the historic Albertina Kerr Louise Home will undergo its first major renovation in more than 30 years.

The 3-story 12,000 sq.ft. Georgian style building is the oldest and most recognizable building on the <u>Albertina Kerr</u> Gresham campus at 722 NE 162nd Ave.

The Louise Home will retain its historic structure and facade and receive a full

interior renovation including seismic, structural and ADA building updates. A modern 2-story 4,000 sq.ft. addition between the two wings on the east side of the building will complete the renovation providing much needed space for Albertina Kerr programs and support staff.

While preliminary work has already begun, the planned start for the renovation is See **LOUISE** Page 4

Reynolds School District 2014 Athletic Hall of Fame Banquet, Sat Nov 24, 2014

The <u>Reynolds School District</u> is proud to announce the 2014 class of inductees to the Athletics Hall of Fame:

• Mike Kostrba (1956-1960): Mike was a three-sport standout in football, wrestling and track and field. During his senior year, he earned a place in the state wrestling meet, all-conference honors in football, and was named to the Shrine All-Star football game. Mike went on to compete in football at Lewis and Clark College where he helped lead the Pioneers to an undefeated season in 1963. Mike went on to serve as the athletic director at Sandy High School.

• Jeff Wiens (1975-2005): Jeff began his career as a health teacher and assistant baseball coach at Reynolds High School in 1975, by the spring of 1978, Jeff had taken over the head coaching duties and led the Lancers to the Columbia Division title. In 1980, Jeff became the athletic director at Reynolds, but in 1986 he coached the softball team to a runner-up finish in the OSAA state championships. Jeff's leadership was invaluable during the consolidation of Reynolds and Columbia High Schools in 1989.

• Daniel Bennett (1971-74): Dan was a standout in football, basketball and track and field. As a junior, Dan led the Lancers to a fourth place finish in the state basketball tournament and was named to the all-tournament team. He also earned league and state honors in both basketball and football during his junior and senior seasons, including first team all-state and honorable mention all-America in basketball. Dan concluded his basketball career at the Oregon Institute of Technology, where he helped the Owls qualify for the NAIA National Championships in 1978.



Save the date- Monday, November 17th, is WENA's Annual Meeting, 7PM at St. Aidan's Episcopal Church, 174th & NE Glisan Street. Speakers & topics will include: Brenda Allen, Multnomah County Asst. You may have noticed considerable activity at Nadaka Nature Park this past couple of months. Dirt was moved and pilings added for the Children's Nature Play area. Several hundred yards of concrete has been poured to create easy-access pathways through the park. Widening of Pacific Street will soon be complete making a much nicer route for Cypress Park residents. There will be a report given at the upcoming meeting about the community gardens and a detailed update on the progress at the park.

"The new facility will allow Friends to better serve their East County youth where they live," says Young. "Youth told us what they wanted was a home-like and calm environment, and that's how we've designed the building."

Demolition of the previous building was underway when a recent fire broke out at the site. "This was a very harrowing moment for our project, since the existing gymnasium is included in the plans for our new facility," Young explains. "Thankfully, the <u>Gresham Fire Department</u> responded very quickly. We've been working closely with the City so they were aware of our plans and were able to save the gym and our project."

According to Young, the new space will also serve the wider community through collaboration with multiple service organizations which include <u>Boys and Girls Club</u>, <u>Rosemary Anderson</u>/POIC and <u>Rockwood</u> <u>Pathways Collaborative</u>. Through a significant investment of \$250,000 by the <u>Windermere Foundation</u>, the space will include an integrated, centralized learning kitchen tival activities included the Aztec Dancers, Audubon Society educational birds, NW Panman, face painters & craft volunteers. For the 4th straight year Albertsons fed everyone in attendance, serving 150 hot dogs & buns plus sodas & chips. Thank you Albertsons staff & managers!! Nadaka Nature Park & Garden Project

Wow, 2014 has certainly been the most amazing year yet at Nadaka. Construction began in August on the south two acre site next to <u>St. Aidan's Episcopal Church</u>. At the time of this article the community garden has been plowed and irrigation installed. The covered picnic shelter should be complete by newsletter distribution. The north end of the nature based play area is finished and the rest is halfway complete. Construction should be complete by the end of November.

On July 19th the 2nd Walk & Talk took place. Three former <u>Camp Fire Girls</u> shared stories about their days at Nadaka. This Spring we hope to hold a Camp Fire Girls Tea fundraiser. So far this year there have been 478 volunteers working at Nadaka for a total of 1,286 volunteer hours! These volunteer hours are used as match for the grants we have received. In addition to groups mentioned in the last WENA newsletter Springwater Trail High School students, Confluence Environmental Center AmeriCorp members and East Hill Church have volunteered at Nadaka.

The Oregon Tradeswomen have built two sheds, four ADA raised beds and eight berry trellises for the community garden. During their seven week project St. Aidan's generously made their facilities available to the women. Thank you so much St. Aidan's.

<u>Cedar Mills</u>, the City of Gresham's general contractor on the job has been working really well with the Nadaka Team of <u>Verde</u>, Oregon Tradeswomen and <u>Belkor Log Works</u>. This project is truly a team effort. Just a reminder that grant funds are paying for the building of this park from <u>Metro</u>, <u>East Multnomah</u> <u>Soil & Water Conservation District</u> and <u>Oregon Parks & Recreation</u>, not City funds.

Some additional interesting facts about this one of a kind citizen driven project: • Logs for the longhouse play structure were donated by <u>Tualatin Hills Parks & Recreation</u>.

• All other wood elements are from Douglas Firs removed from Nadaka because of laminated root rot.

• The gravel removed from the easement road that was down the middle of the two acres was reused onsite.

• Sustainable juniper from <u>Northwest Sustainable Wood</u> was used for the ADA boxes and trellises.

• Boulders for the play area were from the Rockwood Police Station on NE 181st when it was being built.

• It has provided jobs and job training for women and minorities through Oregon Tradeswomen, Inc, and Verde.

In July the Friends of Nadaka received a \$61,000 <u>Nature in</u> <u>Neighborhoods grant</u> from Metro. This will be used to hire a Nadaka Project Coordinator in January 2015. It will also enable us to have programs for youth at Nadaka next summer. The <u>Co-</u> <u>lumbia Slough Watershed Council</u> and <u>Audubon Society of Port-</u> <u>land</u> will take the lead on these programs. <u>Outgrowing Hunger</u> will also provide some classes around the community garden. An Ambassador Program is planned to create more eyes on the park as well as environmental education.

The Audubon Society of Portland through its <u>TALON program</u> (TALON stands for Teach, Advocate, Lead, Observe, and Nurture) has created a "Birds of Nadaka" brochure which should be available soon. Audubon's Conservation Education Coordinator Gladys Ruiz staff's Audubon's Eastside Office at <u>Leach Botanical Garden</u> along with Urban Conservationist Jim Labbe.

October 6th was the first day the new group of <u>HB Lee SUN</u> students went to Nadaka. They will be going every Wednesday after school, weather permitting. The students learn about the plants and trees in the forest and remove invasives. St. Aidan's is again providing snacks for the students each Wednesday.

Work began October 16th on NE Pacific with removal of the chain link fence. A sidewalk will be installed, rain gardens on the north side, ADA ramps at the corners and the entry improved. It is now beginning to look like a real park that the neighborhood can be proud of. The Pacific Street project is being funded with Federal grant dollars.

The <u>Friends of Nadaka</u> and St. Aidan's Episcopal Church wrote letters of support for the City's <u>HEAL</u> Cities Small Grant application for a pedestrian crossing to hopefully slow traffic down along this stretch of NE Glisan making it safer to cross. The grant was awarded and the crossing will go in next year.

On October 25th a No Ivy Day Event was held at Nadaka. This was organized by the City of Gresham and Friends of Nadaka to coincide with the <u>City of Portland's 2014 No Ivy Day</u> which they have held once a year. This is the first time a group in Gresham has participated. Another first for Nadaka.

The Friends of Nadaka still need contributions from individuals, businesses and organizations to continue to build this project. <u>Columbia Slough Watershed Council</u> (CSWC) is the Friends' fiscal agent and they are a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization so any donations are tax deductible. Grant funds have covered most major construction but contributions are still needed to cover things like community garden tools, signage, bike racks, benches, printing, copying, paint for sheds, etc.

The community garden will be run by Adam Kohl of <u>Outgrow-ing Hunger</u>. If you are interested in a plot or volunteering contact Adam at 971-231-4191 or <u>adam@outgrowinghunger.org</u>.

December 2014, with project completion scheduled for September 2015.

Albertina Kerr's campus is currently undergoing a major revitalization. This fall the non-profit recently celebrated the completion of a 6,000 square foot expansion of the Crisis Psychiatric Care unit, a new 4,500 square foot Intensive Treatment group home and the addition of a second neighborhood group home nearby. To complete the 10-acre campus overhaul, the historic Louise Home will be expanded and renovated into a modern hub for community-based child mental health services and foster care.

The completed Campus for Children's Mental Health will bring together, at a single site, leading children's mental health practitioners, critical program services and facilities that are Albertina Kerr's hallmark.
