When A Natural Disaster Strikes Will You And Your Family Be Ready?

Experts Warn Cascadia Is Overdue For A 9.0 Earthquake

Everyday you hear the warnings, "Be informed. Build a kit. Make a plan". Have you made a kit? Do you have a plan? If you're like most of us - you're not ready. Here's some handy tips and important resources to help you be prepared for a disaster.

TICK. TOCK.

Think of Oregon geology as a clock, measuring time in earthquakes. Tick: a magnitude 8 quake. (Bigger than 1989 Bay Area quake that killed 63 people.) Tock: a magnitude 9. (Same as the 2011 Japan quake that killed almost 16,000 people.) On average, a major quake happens in our area every 243 years, the last one was January 26, 1700 — 316 years ago. Yes. We are overdue.

When the next *Big One* does happen, a 700-mile long section of the tectonic plate known as the Juan de Fuca, stretching from British Columbia to Northern California, will slide beneath the North American plate, causing the entire Northwest coast-line to sink up to 6.6 feet. This won't be a



California-style short burst of energy quake in the earth's upper crust. The *Big One* will be bigger, deeper, and last longer: 3–4 minutes, with dozens of aftershocks, some very powerful, for days, months, or later.

Hillsides will slide. Buildings will collapse. Roads will buckle. High-rises will sway. Bridges will crack. Some will fall. Pipes will snap. Within 20 minutes, the first of several 40-foot tsunami waves will wash away the Oregon Coast's low-lying towns.

We have some grant funds to pay for this -- but someone could also volunteer time. <u>MIG</u> has done the design for the fishing pier.



Craig Smith with Waterside Apts will not be available for our March 28th public meeting, however Smith will be on the agenda for the August 22nd public meeting. Smith has promised to send us progress reports on how the project is doing. You may have already received an e-mail concerning Watrside's application to the City of Gresham. There's been considerable activity in code issues reports to the City of Gresham NET (Neighborhood Enforcement Team) group. Issues include abandoned cars. cars parked in bike lanes, blocked driveways, graffiti, foliage blocking your line of sight at intersections & side streets, and stolen property. During the last five (5) months several home businesses involving automobile repair & restoration have been reported because these businesses where using residential streets to park their inventory. We encourage you to use this department to report your concerns. You may phone the NET group at 503 618 2866. They will contact the owner as well as inspect the property in question to rectify the issue(s). Including a photo is very helpful.

Lori Stegmann

Lori Stegmann is currently serving her second term on the Gresham City Council. Prior to that she served on the Planning Commission. She has been an activist and community volunteer for over a decade. She is a proud member of Soroptimist International of Gresham, a service organization committed to improving the lives of women and girls through programs leading to social and economic empowerment. And is well

known for their annual community and fundraising event - the Teddy Bear Parade held in downtown Gresham. Lori cofounded the Rockwood Business Coalition and is a member of the Gresham Area Chamber of Commerce.

Councilor Stegmann was born in Seoul Korea and abandoned by her birth parents. She immigrated to the US when she was adopted as an infant. She grew up in the Rockwood neighborhood and graduated from Parkrose High School. She put herself through college while working and graduated from Mt Hood Community College and Portland State University with her degree in business. She has al-ways been grateful for the opportunities she received through great American institutions like free public education.

She has been a small business owner in the Rockwood neighborhood for the last 22 years, providing support and caring for the local community through her Farmers Insurance Agency.

She is also a candidate for Multhomah County Commission, District 4 where she hopes to bring her passion for addressing social issues combined with her business acumen to serve East County residents.

Lori's journey, from being saved as an orphan to her public service as an elected official, has shaped her desire to serve and represent our community. She is active on the Gresham Home-less Action Team and is working diligently with government entities, non-profits, neighborhood associations, and the faith-based community to collectively work together to find meaningful solutions to homelessness.

Amanda Schroeder

I served as an American Federation of Government Employees (AFGE) Local 2157 union steward at the Portland VA Regional Office, from July 2008 then as the 2nd Vice President from February 2009 to 2013, and am currently President of the Local. I am currently serving my second term as National Women's Advisory Coordinator for AFGE's Eleventh District, which includes Alaska, Colorado, Idaho, Montana, Oregon,

Utah, Washington, Utah, Okinawa, and Guam. As the National Women's Advisory Coordinator for the Eleventh District, I also serve as a member of AFGE's National Human Rights Committee.

As the National Women's Advisory Coordinator, I testified on behalf of AFGE in favor of Oregon House Bill 4077, "The Healthy Teen Relationship Act," a bipartisan bill co-sponsored by Representative Jules Bailey and Representative Matt Wand. Governor John Kitzhaber signed this bill into law in March 2012. I also deployed members to speak in support of House Bill 3479, creating a Women Veterans Coordinator, and applauded the passing of Senate Bill 946, creating the position of LGBT Veterans Coordinator.

I served as the State Lead Organizer for the "Unite Against the War on Women" rally that was held in April 2012, a grassroots movement whose mission is to protect and advance women's rights at all levels and across our lifespan. Priority areas include women's reproductive rights; women's economic equality and workers' rights; protecting women and children from violence & abuse; voting rights; and women's wellness, health and safety.

I was awarded the Elsie Schrader Outstanding Achievement in Labor on August 7, 2012 at the Washington State AFL-CIO 2012 Convention, an award recognizing advancement of women into leadership roles and activism on behalf of women within the labor movement.

If our next "subduction zone" quake unleashes its full potential, it will be the worst natural disaster in U.S. history. But there are crucial steps we can take as individuals. Preparation may mean the difference between finding your loved ones or not; between sleeping inside your mildly damaged house or on a cot in a refugee center; between going hungry and thirsty for days or managing until supplies arrive. And, between living and dying.

As soon as you feel the shaking:

• **DROP** down onto your hands and knees before the quake knocks you down.

• **COVER** your head and neck with your arms to protect yourself from falling debris or get under a desk or table.

• **HOLD ON** to any sturdy covering so you can move with it until the shaking stops.

When the shaking stops get outside away from buildings.

How will we get around?

By foot, bike, and boat, mostly. People will be stuck where they are for quite some time. Prepare to bond with the people you're with - whoever they are - or get walking. Get some bikes. Fuel will be tight for days, even months, so keep your vehicle filled. What will we drink?

Your faucets (and toilets) will be dry for weeks, maybe months. The Bull Run dams are expected to survive, but many water mains are brittle cast iron. Reservoirs will crack; treatment facilities and pump stations will fail. For the first few weeks, water will have to be pumped, purified, and trucked.

Did You Know? You can <u>make water safe</u> with 16 drops of unscented liquid bleach per gallon on water. Wait 30 minutes.

Where will we poo?

The Portland group <u>Public Hygiene Lets Us Stay Human</u> (phlush.org) has an <u>emergency "two bucket" toilet system</u> to maintain hygiene, like those used in New Zealand after the 2011 quake. It's safe and manageable. And, you can store your other emergency supplies inside the buckets until needed. What will we eat?

The quake will shake the whole Northwest, from British Columbia to California. Grocery and "big-box" stores are likely to suffer severe damage. Bridges, highways, and railroad lines may not be passable. Create an inventory of several weeks of non-perishable food. Stock up now.

Make a plan

First make a plan for your family, taking into account different scenarios, such as if the quake were to strike during the work or school day. Establish a meeting point if family members are away from home. Plan how you will communicate with family members (text messages may be best). Secure items that might fall and cause injuries (ie. TV's, bookshelves, mirrors, pictures, cabinets, light fixtures, water heaters). Practice *DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON*. Store critical supplies and documents. Download this free Map Your Neighborhood kit, and print these American Red Cross Emergency Contact Cards for each household member.

Build a kit

Don't think that your kit must immediately be perfect. Many of the items you need are probably lying around the house. You can add to the kit as time and money allow. Download this free brochure that shows you how to <u>assemble a robust emergency</u> <u>kit in 12-weeks</u> purchasing or collecting a few items each week. Store everything inside plastic buckets and tote bins with lids.

Find a good place to keep your kit. A garden shed or garage makes a great choice over storing your kit in an inside closet.
