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TriMet Safe Travel Tips



• The Transit Police Division does not operate shifts 24/7 so emergencies outside of their normal work shifts are handled by local law enforcement agencies (Gresham, Beaverton, Hillsboro, and Portland)

• Buses and Max cars have over 4,400 cameras but they are not actively being monitored at any given time so waving your hands in front of a camera will most likely not get anyone's attention. Therefore, call 9-1-1 in an emergency

• Be aware of your surroundings and make yourself less attractive as a target since most thefts are crimes of opportunity

• Uniformed security and Trimet information employees, wearing green or white tops, do not have immediate access to police dispatch. So, once again, if you have an emergency, call 9-1-1

• Max cars are outfitted with intercom buttons that allow you to communicate with the conductor. However, conductors also do not have direct access to police dispatch so contacting 9-1-1 is the most expeditious manner to obtain a police or medical response in an emergency

• Know the bus/max number of vehicle you're on, the direction of travel, and be aware of the roads you're near, or stops you've just made in case you need to report an emergency. This information can be vital to help the emergency responders arrive at your location in an emergency and reduce the time it takes trying to calculate the location of the emergency



Dear Neighbors • a message from your WENA President

Dear Neighbors -

Spring is right around the corner and things look pretty nice at the moment. Our grass is looking very green & the Dauphine bush is in full bloom & fragrant.

We continue to have several land-use issues, some which have been in the works since spring of last year. We haven't heard anything more on the proposed <u>Waterside</u> <u>Apartments project</u> at 165th & NE Halsey; however we have been promised a speaker from SGS Construction who will give an update at our Monday March 12th public meeting. The 4-story, 122 room Woodspring Suites at 181st & NE Sandy Blvd has yet to break ground but the project is moving forward. And, Rick's Custom Fencing & Decking has broken ground for their new Gresham store at 178th & NE Halsey which is scheduled to open sometime this fall.

In case you missed it: a new self-managed homeless camp sprang up January 27th just north of the Wilkes East Neighborhood. Called the "<u>Village of Hope</u>", it sat on City of Portland owned land along the Columbia River Slough near 170th & NE Airport Way. Officials cleared out the camp February 2nd; Oregon Public Broadcasting <u>reported</u> <u>February 8th</u> the Joint Office for Homeless Services is looking for a new site (to replace the closed shelter at 159th & SE Stark) that can better serve a larger number of homeless families. Top of the county's list: a furniture warehouse at SE 148th Avenue and Stark Street, which the county estimates could serve up to 200 parents and children.

Spring is in the air as you walk through the forest at Nadaka Nature Park! The first leaves of the Indian Plumb and Red Flowering Currant are emerging, squirrels are venturing boldly across the paths, and the sound of song birds can be heard among the trees. As

the park begins to emerge from winter, the Friends of Nadaka are excited to start hosting gardening workshops, forest restoration events, nature walks, and story time for the little ones. There will be numerous opportunities for you to get outside and spend time with friends and family this spring.

Interested in finding new plants for your yard? Join friends and neighbors to share free plants to add to your garden at the Spring Plant Swap happening Saturday, March 10th from 10 AM to 12 PM! Bring labeled plants or seeds to swap. Receive a free plant that supports pollinators. Gardening experts will be available to help! This event will be held in the Nadaka/St. Aidan's parking lot and is hosted by Backyard Habitat Certification Program, City of Gresham, Audubon Society of Portland, East Multhomah Soil and Water Conservation District, St. Aidan's, and Friends of Nadaka. Nadaka is thrilled to be hosting Welcome Back Vulture Day Saturday, March 17th from 12-3 PM with Audubon Society of Portland and St. Aidan's Episcopal Church for the third year in a row. This year we hosted a class for Spanish speakers (Siembra la Cena) in addition to our English speaking class (Seed to Supper) at St. Aidan's Episcopal Church and the Nadaka Community Garden. Both classes had presentations, books, resources, and instruction in their respective languages. We hope to continue offering multilingual/multicultural programming as we continue improving upon our existing programming. On Monday, January 15th we hosted our 2nd MLK Day of Service at Nadaka Nature Park with community members and Campus Compact; a program that brings college students from a variety of universities to volunteer at various sites around the city. This amazing group planted natives along NE Pacific Street and the rain garden, removed invasive blackberries, mulched paths. and added coffee grounds donated from Boyd's Coffee to the community garden and blueberries.

In February, we had a great show of community support at the



3rd Nadaka Community Planting Event where our volunteers planted over 300 native plants and mulched new plants and paths! This year we are focused on restoring habitat for wildlife and pollinators along the NE Pacific entrance, the main forest loop, and the south side of the meadow by planting Oregon grape, roses, kinnikinnik, and fringecup. As we continue these restoration efforts we are keeping in mind various CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) concepts where appropriate. As you walk through the park keep an eye out for these amazing

new additions.
