Shelters Quickly Fill As Portland Drops Homeless On Gresham's Doorstep

New Shelters On Stark, Burnside and Glisan Offer Hope for East County's Homeless. More needed.

Homeless. You see it everywhere. Not just downtown on skid row, but on local streets, pushing old shopping carts full of belongings or camping in the bushes. Where did they come from? Why are there so many?

Ten years ago, Portland said it would end homelessness. Today thousands still sleep outside every night in the metro area. Help is everywhere, housing is not.

As the City of Portland prepares to clearout the hundreds of homeless campers along the Springwater Corridor Trail social service agencies and suburban communities like Gresham brace for the potential influx of homeless individuals moving into East Multnomah County.

This year alone three new homeless shelters with a total of 468 beds have opened within a 2.5 mile area between 122nd Ave and 162nd Ave as part of Multnomah County's "A Home for Everyone" program to aid the homeless.



In February 2016 a year-round family shelter opened at 16015 SE Stark, operated by Human Solutions, with space for 134 guests offering a kitchen, showers, laundry, computer lab, and services. In late July a second year-round family shelter opened in the Hansen Building (former Multnomah County Sheriffs office) at 122nd & NE Glisan with space for 200 adults offering service by day and shelter at night. And early this fall, a 134 bed year-round women's only shelter will open at 16141 E Burnside operated by Multnomah County and Human Solutions offering overnight shelter and services. All but a handful of these beds are taken, and many more are still needed.

NEWS ITEMS

Like all of you, we've been consumed by the news of homeless shelters being opened in our area and concern for our community. Join us Monday, August 22nd 7PM as the project coordinator for Multnomah County Chair Deborah Kafoury's office discusses homeless projects in our area.

We were a bit shocked by the news of printing giant RR Donnelley's decision to permanently close its plant at 17401 NE Halsey St, after so many years in our community. Cuts began around Aug. 1. The closure is a loss of 113 jobs.

LAND USE

Land-use continues to take up much of our time. Here's a run down of those items:

The Waterside project at 165th & NE Halsey has begun land preparation. The board met with SGS Development LLC developer Chet Antonsen & project coordinator Craig Smith during the July Board meeting. A public-app meeting was held Wednesday August 2, where Smith gave those in attendance an update & took questions about the project. Craig Smith will speak at our upcoming August Public Meeting about their progress & offer a timeline for the project.

We added one (1) new land-use item to our list. Rick's Fencing (on 201st & SE Stark) has requested a zoning change for the vacant property at 178th & NE Halsey (west of the Arco station). They are proposing an 8,400 SF retail commercial building with outside storage yard. Other land-use items in progress are: Courtyard by Marriott, NE 181 near exit 13; Christensen Electric at 172 & NE Sacramento; Columbia Care at 17720 NE Halsey; Wilkes East Elementary School; Chevron Station project at 181st & NE Sandy Blvd; and Stark Firs Apartments at 641 NE 162nd.

CODE ISSUES

Code issues continue to be a problem. Quite a few illegally parked cars in the bike

lanes have been noted along NE Halsey St between 162nd & 181st, as well as along 172nd between NE Glisan & NE Halsey. We encourage you to take pictures to send along when reporting to the NET group (Neighborhood Enforcement Team) at the City of Gresham. Report abandoned cars, blocked driveways, graffiti, foliage blocking line of sight at intersections & side streets, and stolen property to 503.618.2866, online at greshamoregon.gov/services/mygresham or download the Free "MyGresham" app" for Apple or Android. Using "MyGresham" is every bit as good as a phone call.

Dress to work in natural areas: long pants, brimmed hat, and closed-toe sturdy shoes. Please bring a water bottle and a friend! Businesses, schools and community groups are welcome! Activities include: invasive plant removal, litter cleanup, working in the community garden. This event is a great way to give back to the community and meet others in the neighborhood with similar interests.

The past few months have been an exciting time at Nadaka. Since March, we have partnered with Audubon Society of Portland to host the "Welcome Back Vulture Day" event, five Bird Walks and Jim Labbe led a Bird Walk for Russian Speakers. Ivy Watson, City of Gresham, and Heather Buley, Backyard Habitat Certification Program, led a Plant ID Walk. Ecumenical Ministries of Oregon and Growing Gardens taught a free Container Gardening Workshop at the park for community members. Our Second Annual Nadaka Tea Fundraiser in June secured approximately \$1,000 for park programming. Partners and community members donated items such as refreshments, space, tea tableware as well as jewelry, home goods, gift cards, and more as raffle items. This event was a wonderful way for community members to meet their neighbors and support Nadaka Nature Park.

Other events include "Tadpole Tales" for 2-5 year olds, a Nature Art Camp June 20-24th, with St. Aidan's Episcopal Church, and three day camps at Nadaka with games, education, art, and gardening in partnership with Latino Network. People, Places, and Things came to Nadaka for their "English in the Park" field trip for the "Exploring Nature, Exploring Language" program. Montavilla United Methodist Church's M&M's Walking Group had a tour and plant walk at the park. Two bilingual Nature Discovery Days were held at the park for moms and children under the age of seven with Mount Hood Community College's "Early Head Start" group and the "Healthy Families" group. 'Friends of Nadaka' has also worked consistently with three SUN programs to provide environmental education, stewardship opportunities, and a safe place for students to explore and play both in the classroom and at the park.

Stewardship at Nadaka was robust with 5 public events and 4 private events to remove invasive species, planting natives, litter removal, mulching and general park maintenance in the forest, garden, front two acres, and nature based play area. The largest stewardship event in the history of Nadaka was during City of Gresham's 3rd Annual Green & Clean Event Day of Service with 152 volunteers. We also partnered with SOLVE for our Community Planting Event, SOLVE It for Earth Day Cleanup, and a stewardship day for the SUN youth from HB Lee Middle School, Glenfair, Salish Ponds, and Hartley Elementary schools. Private stewardship events were held for the TIVNU youth group, the MESD/Wheatley School (trains disabled individuals for future employment opportunities), US Bank, and Portland Adventist Academy.

We have been fortunate to have a team of wonderful interns at the park the past two months. This year we have had two SummerWorks interns, four Talon Apprentices from Audubon Society of Portland, and 8 STRYVE (Striving to Reduce Youth Violence Everywhere) helping with environmental education, camps, stewardship, gardening, and outreach at the park. This wonderful

group of young professionals are making a huge difference in their community and gaining experience for future job opportunities. Please feel free to stop by the park and tell them what a wonderful job they are doing!

Wilkes Elementary School Design Selected



After months of community outreach and public input the Reynolds School District has chosen a design for the new Wilkes Elementary School located at 169th & NE Wilkes Rd, Portland OR. In 2015 Reynolds School District No.7 completed a *Facility Master Plan* which called for the replacement of the Wilkes Elementary School building on the current site because the existing school (which is the oldest in the district, and dates to the late 1880's) was determined to be a high seismic risk with cost to re-

pair it outweighing the cost to replace it. In May 2015 voters approved a \$125 million bond to fund this and other district projects.

The new 72,000 SF twostory school will be located in the playfield south of the current building on the 5.33 acre site. The current school will remain in operation until the new building is ready for occupancy.

The new school has 31 classrooms with capacity for 588 students, and parking for 8 large buses, 4 small buses, 67 cars and 16 bicycles. ■

Have You Prepared Yet?

"Subduction zone earthquakes off Oregon, Washington more frequent than previous estimates"

Oregon State University, Aug 5, 2016

CORVALIS, OR - A new OSU study suggests massive earth-

quakes on northern sections of the Cascadia Subduction Zone, affecting areas of the Pacific Northwest with major population centers such as Portland, Tacoma, Seattle and Vancouver BC, are somewhat more frequent than previously believed. The chance of one occurring within the next 50 years is also slightly higher than previously estimated.

A section of the zone from Newport to Astoria, Oregon, was previously believed to rupture on average every 400-500 years, that average has now been reduced to 350 years.

The last major earthquake on the Cascadia Subduction Zone occurred in January 1700, more than 315 years ago.
